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Foreword

On December 13, 2001, after having completed extensive analysis work and after having held public consultations in several cities, the Commission de la représentation électorale established the delimitation of the 125 electoral divisions of Québec and assigned them names.

The purpose of this document is to present the new electoral map. It briefly recalls the steps that led to the adoption of the new delimitation of the electoral divisions, explains the Commission's decision, provides the descriptions and indicates the names of the electoral divisions. A map illustrating the new delimitation accompanies this document.

In publishing this document, the Commission de la représentation électorale would like to offer interested persons a reference tool dealing with its entire approach.

1. A look back at the work of the Commission de la représentation électorale

Pursuant to the *Election Act*, the Commission de la représentation électorale makes a new delimitation of the electoral divisions after the second general election following the last delimitation. As the last electoral map came into force at the time of the dissolution of the National Assembly for the 1994 general election, the Commission began its work following the November 30, 1998 general election. However, an Act passed by the National Assembly in June 1999 suspended this work until June 30, 2000.

On July 1, 2000, the Commission de la représentation électorale resumed its work and in December of the same year tabled in the National Assembly a preliminary report entitled *Proposal for the delimitation of a new electoral map 2000*. Thereafter, in March and April 2001, the Commission held a series of public hearings. The analysis of all the comments and recommendations made convinced the Commission of the need to propose a new delimitation for the Montréal region. This proposal gave rise to a second report made public on June 19, 2001. This report was entitled *Proposal for the delimitation of a new electoral map 2000 – Montréal Region*.

An amendment made to the *Election Act* in June 2001 authorized the Commission to once again consult the population on any proposed change to its preliminary report as well as to any future preliminary reports, when the Commission deems such action appropriate. This legislative amendment made it possible to hold, in September 2001, new public hearings in the Montréal region to hear the comments of MNAs, citizens and organizations interested in the proposal.

On October 3, 2001, the preliminary report of December 2000 and the new proposal dealing with the Montréal region, tabled in June 2001, were submitted to the Committee on the National Assembly for consideration. After having analyzed all of the comments heard, the Commission de la représentation électorale prepared a new delimitation and a report entitled *Electoral Map of Québec – December 2001 Report*. This report, tabled in the National Assembly on December 5, 2001, presents the names and the descriptions of the 125 electoral divisions.

The report was subject to a debate limited to five hours in the National Assembly on December 5 and 6, 2001. The Commission then established the final delimitation and the names of the new electoral divisions of Québec. On December 18, 2001, the list of the new electoral divisions was published in the *Gazette officielle du Québec*.

2. Decision of the Commission de la représentation électorale

The Commission de la représentation électorale has maintained at 125 the number of electoral divisions in Québec, which corresponds to the upper limit set in the *Election Act*. Moreover, in comparison with the previous electoral map, 71 electoral divisions have different boundaries. The purpose of these changes is to ensure a better distribution of electors and to harmonize certain boundaries of the electoral divisions with the administrative boundaries. The following table presents the numerical framework and the general data on the new delimitation.

The main changes were made in the Greater Montréal Region. Two new electoral divisions were created, namely one in Montérégie and the other in Laurentides-Lanaudière. As for the number of electoral divisions on Île-de-Montréal, it went from 30 to 28. Most of the boundaries of the electoral divisions on the island differ from the previous boundaries.

The boundaries of the electoral divisions of the Québec, Outaouais and Sherbrooke regions also witnessed major changes that involve a large number of electoral divisions. Moreover, several electoral divisions of the Abitibi-Témiscamingue, Nord du Québec, Bas-Saint-Laurent, Chaudière-Appalaches, Estrie, Bois-Francs and Gaspésie regions now have different boundaries. The electoral divisions of the Mauricie and Saguenay–Lac-Saint-Jean regions witnessed minor adjustments, whereas those of the Côte-Nord remained unchanged.

The new electoral map has six electoral divisions that deviate from the numerical criterion set by the *Election Act*. The electoral division of Îles-de-la-Madeleine constitutes an exception stipulated in the Act. As for the other five electoral divisions, namely Ungava, Bonaventure, Gaspé, Matane and Matapédia, the Commission de la représentation électorale has decided to maintain them, despite the small number of electors that they have, for the following reasons:

Electoral division of *Ungava*

The electoral division of Ungava comprises the entire municipality of Baie-James. It covers a vast territory inhabited by a small population dispersed at several points of unequal importance. Demographic considerations alone would have justified an extension of the electoral division at the expense of Abitibi or Saguenay–Lac-Saint-Jean. Due to the very large distances that must be covered, the absence of road links between municipalities in outlying areas, potential development projects and the

possibility of a chain reaction that would greatly affect neighbouring regional fabrics, the Commission has no other option but to maintain the electoral division of Ungava in its current status as an exceptional electoral division.

The electoral divisions of *Bonaventure, Gaspé, Matane* and *Matapédia*

The Commission deems that the unusual geography of the Gaspé Peninsula, the low population density, the linear distribution of the population along the coast, in particular for the electoral divisions of Bonaventure, Gaspé and Matane, as well as the distances that must be covered are all factors that compromise the effective representation of the Gaspé population. Indeed, the long distances that must be covered and the transportation infrastructure situation make difficult electors' access to their MNA as well as the access that MNAs have to their constituents. Moreover, it would appear that due to the lack of diversified resources, the limited number of points of public service and the difficulties related to the economic situation, electors as well as municipal, economic, community and other organizations call on their MNAs more often, thereby reducing the possibility for these elected officials to adequately perform their twofold role of legislator and ombudsman. Maintaining the electoral divisions of Bonaventure, Gaspé, Matane and Matapédia ensures a fair representation of the electors of each of the electoral divisions of the Gaspésie.

In the conclusion of its report tabled in December 2001, the Commission describes the problems that ensue from the unequal evolution of the electoral population in the various regions of Québec. The electoral divisions must be delimited in such a way as to respect the principle of the effective representation of electors. This principle, which was recognized by the Supreme Court in 1991, is manifested in the ability for electors to have the best possible access to their elected representative and in the ability of elected officials to adequately perform their twofold role of legislator and ombudsman. The

application of this principle has given rise to increasingly heated and contradictory reactions: the citizens of remote regions who have been seeing the proportion of their electoral population decline want to keep their electoral division, whereas the citizens of regions with high population densities are calling for the addition of electoral divisions. While the first group is in favour of a broader interpretation of the principle of effective representation, the second group insists on the importance of the equality of the number of electors by electoral division. In its report, the Commission concludes that there is a need to initiate a reflection on the means likely to ensure a fair representation for all citizens of Québec.

3. The new names of the electoral divisions

The changes made to the boundaries of the electoral divisions have led the Commission de la représentation électorale to attribute new names to certain electoral divisions after having requested the advice of the Commission de toponymie. Here is the list of these new toponyms and a brief description of their origin.

The electoral division of ***Beauharnois***

This toponym, used since 1829 to name electoral divisions, originates from the patronymic name of the concession-holders of the seigniori bearing the same name, Charles de Beauharnois (1671-1749), who was Governor of New France, and his brother Claude (1674-1738). Moreover, the Ville de Beauharnois, created in 1863, is part of this electoral division.

The electoral division of ***Bourassa-Sauvé***

This new electoral division covers a portion of the northeastern part of Île-de-Montréal and groups the existing electoral divisions of Bourassa and Sauvé.

The Bourassa patronymic name makes reference to Henri Bourassa (1868-1952), journalist, politician and founder of *Le Devoir* in 1910. As for the Sauvé name, it refers to Paul Sauvé (1907-1960) who was a lawyer, politician and Premier of Québec (1959-1960).

The electoral division of *Huntingdon*

Attributed for the first time in 1792 to an electoral division that covered the entire southwest portion of the province, the name Huntingdon traces its origin back to the toponymy of England where this name once identified a county.

This new electoral division covers part of southern Québec, to the west of the rivière Richelieu and comprises, among other things, the Ville de Huntingdon.

The electoral division of *Jean-Lesage*

This new electoral division is made up of part of the quartier Limoilou of Ville de Québec as well as part of the former Ville de Beauport.

The toponym calls to mind Jean Lesage, Prime Minister of Québec from 1960 to 1966. The government of Jean Lesage instituted several reforms, in particular in the health, education, labour and culture fields.

The electoral division of *Jeanne-Mance–Viger*

The new electoral division of Jeanne-Mance–Viger is located on Île-de-Montréal. The combination of the two names recalls the electoral divisions of Jeanne-Mance and Viger.

The first part of this toponym honours the memory of Jeanne Mance (1606-1673), founder of Hôtel-Dieu de Montréal. As for the second part, it refers to Denis-Benjamin Viger (1774-1861), lawyer and MNA, as well as to Jacques Viger (1787-1858), officer, journalist and magistrate who was the first mayor of Montréal (1833-1836), President of the Société Saint-Jean-Baptiste (1856) and founder of the Société historique de Montréal.

The electoral division of *Mirabel*

The name of this new electoral division makes reference to the name of the Ville de Mirabel, which was created in 1971. This municipality covers approximately 80% of the surface area of the new electoral division.

The electoral division of *René-Lévesque*

The new electoral division of René-Lévesque covers a vast territory and comprises several municipalities of the Haute-Côte-Nord.

The new toponym replaces that of the electoral division of Saguenay. It honours the memory of René-Lévesque, Prime Minister of Québec from 1976 to 1985. René Lévesque was responsible, among other things, for the hydroelectric development of this region and the harnessing of the Bersimis, Manicouagan and Outardes rivers.

The electoral division of *Soulanges*

It was in 1853 that an electoral division of Montérégie was given the name of Soulanges for the first time. This name refers to Pierre-Jacques Joybert de Soulanges who, in 1702, gave the name of Soulanges to his seigniory.

4. Coming into force of the electoral map

The new electoral map will come into force upon the dissolution of the National Assembly in preparation for the next general election. Any by-election that is held before the next general election will take place using the previous delimitation.

5. Description of the 125 new electoral divisions

NOTES

The description of the new electoral divisions is presented here in alphabetical order. The figures found in the description represent the electors who appear on Québec's permanent list of electors of Québec as of June 30, 2000.

The municipalities, Indian reserves and settlements, reserved lands, unorganized territories and their boundaries are those that existed on February 19, 2002.

However, an asterisk beside the name of a municipality or an unorganized territory indicates that this involves a legal entity and its boundaries as they existed on December 31, 2001.

Where the words allée, autoroute, avenue, boulevard, chemin, côte, rue, voie, canal, lac, fleuve and rivière, in French and railway line, in English are used, they refer to the median line unless provided otherwise.

At the end of the report readers will find a map of the new electoral divisions. All of these divisions are represented on the front of the map, whereas enlargements of the Montréal, Québec, Sherbrooke, Gatineau and Centre-sud sectors are found on the back.

Abitibi-Est 33,148

The electoral division of Abitibi-Est comprises the following municipalities: Barraute (M), Belcourt (M), Malartic (V), Rivière-Héva (M), Senneterre (P), Senneterre (V) and Val-d'Or (V).

It also comprises the part of the Ville de Rouyn-Noranda corresponding to the Ville de Cadillac* and to the unorganized territories of Lac-Montanier*, Lac-Surimau* and Rapide-des-Cèdres*.

It also comprises the Indian settlement of Kitcisakik, the Indian reserve of Lac-Simon, the localities or hamlets of Beattyville, Colonie-Fournière, Rapide-Deux and Rapide-Sept, and the following unorganized territories: Lac-Fouillac, Lac-Granet, Lac-Metei, Matchi-Manitou and Réservoir-Dozois.

It finally comprises the part of the unorganized territory of Lac-Despinassy composed of the townships of Bartouille (part), Ducros (part) and Laas (part).

Abitibi-Ouest 33,274

The electoral division of Abitibi-Ouest comprises the following municipalities: Amos (V), Authier (M), Authier-Nord (M), Berry (M), Champneuf (M), Chazel (M), Clermont (CT), Clerval (M), Colombourg (M), Duparquet (V), Dupuy (M), Gallichan (M), La Corne (M), La Morandière (M), La Motte (M), Landrienne (CT), La Reine (M), La Sarre (V), Launay (CT), Macamic (V), Normétal (M), Palmarolle (M), Poularies (M), Preissac (M), Rapide-Danseur (M), Rochebaucourt (M), Roquemaure (M), Saint-Dominique-du-Rosaire (M), Saint-Félix-de-Dalquier (M), Sainte-Germaine-Boulé (M), Sainte-Gertrude-Manneville (M), Sainte-Hélène-de-Mancebourg (P), Saint-Lambert (P), Saint-Marc-de-Figuery (P), Saint-Mathieu-d'Harricana (M), Taschereau (M), Trécesson (CT) and Val-Saint-Gilles (M).

It also comprises the Indian reserve of Pikogan, the localities or hamlets of Despinassy, Guyenne, Languedoc and Saint-Eugène-de-Chazel, and the unorganized territories of Lac-Chicobi, Lac-Duparquet and Rivière-Ojima.

It finally comprises part of the unorganized territory of Lac-Despinassy composed of the townships of Bernetz (part), Castagnier (part), Coigny (part), Despinassy, Hurault (part) and Vassal (part).

Acadie 49,523

The electoral division of Acadie comprises part of the Ville de Montréal bounded as follows: the rivière des Prairies including the île Perry, the extension of the boulevard Saint-Laurent, such way and its extension, the autoroute Métropolitaine (40), the avenue Sainte-Croix, the boulevard de la Côte-Vertu, the avenue O'Brien, the limit of the towns of Saint-Laurent* and Montréal* and the autoroute des Laurentides (15).

Anjou 44,051

The electoral division of Anjou comprises part of the Ville de Montréal bounded as follows: the limit of the Ville d'Anjou* with the towns of Montréal-Nord*, Montréal*, Montréal-Est* and Montréal*, the autoroute Transcanadienne (25), the rue Sherbrooke Est, the rue Dickson, the rue Lacordaire and the limit of the Ville de Saint-Léonard* with the towns of Montréal* and Anjou*.

Argenteuil 33,973

Beauce-Nord 36,965
